## FROM PASTOR DAVE

This time of year has been a time of recurring grief, thanksgiving and hope for me. My birthday, cancer surgeries, and Mom's death in April 2016 have all led me to search for meaning. Intentionally gathering specific memories brought thanksgiving to the grief of journeying with Mom toward her death. And each year the anniversaries return, refreshing and deepening the thanksgiving. This year the anniversaries of my high school (1969) and college (1973) graduations have brought a fresh awareness of the deepest trajectories of my life journey in some surprising ways. Not surprising is that God's presence in both the grief and the joy has made authentic thanksgiving possible. I pray that God will be present in your griefs and joys, and that we will all experience the depth and meaning of true thanksgiving.

## Phillips Academy, Andover, MA; Class of 1969

The kitchen table became the place through the years where Mom and I would connect when I came home. I'm just realizing that this tradition of holy conversation started with my time at Andover. The scholarship I had received and my first airplane flight had carried me far beyond our shared experience. I could tell Mom some of the details of the journey, and describe my classes and how the cross country and basketball seasons were going. But I didn't have the words to tell her how challenging to my spirit the entire experience had been. Having always received "A" grades, I was shocked to get a 78 on my first test at Andover, an essay exam in European History. Having been the lead runner on my Windom, MN high school cross country team, I was able to make the Andover varsity, but as the 6<sup>th</sup> runner! These humbling first experiences opened me to learn to think critically, to pursue excellence, and to find my own voice.

As I gather memories of my time at Andover, I am so thankful for the trajectories set in motion that continue to transform my life today. The Gallup StrengthsFinder tells me that my #1 strength is as a Learner! I appreciate the outstanding education I have received. My vision of the world and of God has broadened immeasurably. Andover required every student to participate in both academics and athletics, anticipating the life lesson I have learned that my body carries my spirit.

When Joyce and I attend the 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion in June it will be the first time I have been back to Andover since graduation. This week I received an invitation to participate in a memorial service for our 33 classmates who have died. I will be honored to be part of that meaningful moment in the place where I received so much life.

## Rice University, Houston TX, Class of 1973

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My time at Rice continued to broaden my world view. It was a time of longing and chaos (remember Vietnam?). My search for meaning ultimately led to a call to campus ministry. When Joyce and I returned to Houston last November I showed her around the campus. That walk brought back memories of a seminal moment in my life journey. Virtually alone on campus during Thanksgiving vacation of my Freshman year I went to the Library one day to read for my Philosophy course. I got lost in delight and discovery as I read *The Great Philosophers*, written by our Professor Radoslav Tsanoff. His passionate teaching inspired the love of learning trajectory that transforms me today.

I thank God for the power of our memories to continue to transform lament into joy. I thank God for the power of our memories to continue to transform lament into joy. And I also thank God for the trajectories of our lives that bring us together into this community.



Dear Create, Laugh, and Learn team, On January 24th, Cal & I delivered socks, cold weather kits & your mittens from LCGS to Damiano for the "Community Connect" event. All the agencies that interact with our homeless neighbors were there to provide info on housing, legal aid, etc. as well as health & hygiene care, a free hot meal, & gifts from LCGS and 2 other churches. Surveys on each homeless person's situation were also filled out - a requirement of the Fed. Government so they have an accurate count when considering federal aid for our area. Cal & I had volunteered for the event and were there from opening until closing. We had the pleasure of passing out all those gifts from our church. Let me relate some comments and some insights that Cal & I had:

- It was a very cold day with extremely cold temps on the way. The majority of the people had no hand covering when they came into Damiano.
- Your mittens were equally popular with women and men.
- The smaller mittens went to children and grandchildren who were in school that day.
- For every pair of mittens given away, we received a huge smile, many complements about how nice they were and may heartfelt thanks.
- The News Tribune photographer was so taken by the story of your repurposed mittens that he sent over a staff writer for the paper to make sure your mittens were highlighted in the article that came out the next day.
- One mitten in each pair contained a note from the LCGS Sunday School kids, a colored picture of a mitten with a word of hope that the mittens would bring comfort from the cold to the recipient. One gentleman found a pair mittens that fit & in putting them both on, he turned to his friend and said "I have a piece of paper in one of the mittens." Before opening the folded note he said, "I bet someone sent me a love note." and we replied, "you are exactly right."

I wish you all could have been present for people to thank you in person but know that you touched a lot of peoples hearts and kept a lot of hands nice and warm! Thank you, Amy & Cal Loken

## Capital Needs Planning and Funding

Almost two years ago, church leaders decided to put \$40,000 of the generous Silverberg estate gift to Good Shepherd towards a new capital needs fund for the church. A capital needs fund is not part of the operating budget and is used when a major piece of equipment or an important part of the church's physical plant—the HVAC system, the roof, the parking lot, major appliances, that old stretch of sidewalk—stops working, falls in,

buckles, and/or cracks, requiring the church to come up with the money to cover major repairs or even replacement. It was a timely decision. Last year, the roof over the Gathering Space started leaking and a contract for repair was signed last fall for work to start this year.

Long a feature of residential community/homeowner association management, formal capital reserve planning is a relative rarity in the world of worship facilities, according to Jim Sheppard, principal of Atlanta-based Generis, a church fundraising consultant. Indeed, "One reason organizations like ours probably exist is because not

very many churches are doing this," Sheppard says. "My experience has been that while most churches are very careful about planning ahead and establishing reserves for operations, replacement/repair funding for facilities and other capital items is typically handled on an as-needed basis." That's not good.

"When a church pays many millions to put up a building to serve as part of its ministry, it has the responsibility to be a good steward and take care of it over the years," Sheppard says. Endowing a capital reserve fund enables a church to ensure that the building and its systems are maintained, "preserving the building and the vision that created it in the first place."

Good stewardship practices match people's passions with many different giving opportunities beyond the weekly offering plate. At Good Shepherd there are many special giving opportunities such as ELCA World Hunger, ELCA Global Missions and seasonal opportunities for community outreach such as our Lenten offer-



ing to America's Second Harvest. The Stewardship Committee would like to encourage you to consider giving generously this year to *both* our worthy charitable partners as well as to sound ongoing stewardship of our physical assets - our beloved church home where "all are welcome." Gifts to the capital needs fund may be made online, via the offering plate or by mail.
