What/who do you notice that needs prayer? Do you have something to thank God for? Or to ask God's help with? Bring your prayers to worship and we'll include them in the prayers of intercession!

Stewardship Annual Financial Response 2021: October 10-24

I have not hidden your saving help within my heart,
I have spoken of your faithfulness and your salvation;

During this year's Annual Financial Response, the Stewardship Committee invites the congregation to deeper discipleship and shared learning from the NE MN Synod lay leader program. We give financially to things in our life that have meaning and value in our lives. In our troubled times, our church's vital mission of personal transformation and salvation for the world is needed more than ever.

Psalm 40 is titled "Thanksgiving for Deliverance and Prayer for Help." As I was enjoying Pastor Dave's Sabbatical Psalm study this summer, I was struck how well verse 10 captured the importance of *not* continuing to keep our stories "hidden." Our stories are powerful to share our connection with God and others during difficult times. We also share our stories of thanksgiving and joy and calls to increased personal commitment to God's mission. We invite you to sign up for a 3- week small group in October to share (or listen) to our stories of struggles, saving help and faithfulness. Sign up will begin mid-September in the Gathering Space.

We are very excited also to have Dr. Andrew Root as our guest homilist and adult forum speaker on Sunday October 10, 2021. Root puts together theology and storytelling to explore how ministry leads us into encounter with divine action. At the forum he will speaking on "Why are we all so exhausted? The Church in a Time Crisis" Childcare will be provided.

Andrew Root has spoken several times in the NE MN synod and lay leader program and is the Carrie Olson Baalson Professor of Youth and Family Ministry at Luther Seminary, USA. He writes and researches in areas of theology, ministry, culture and younger generations. His most recent books are Congregation in a Secular Age (Baker, 2021), The End of Youth Ministry? (Baker, 2020), The Pastor in a Secular Age: Ministry to People Who No Longer Need God (Baker, 2019), Faith Formation in a Secular Age (Baker, 2017), and Exploding Stars, Dead Dinosaurs, and Zombies: Youth Ministry in the Age of Science (Fortress Press, 2018).


CONFIRMATION

Dear Members of Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd,

We have been impacted by the pandemic but are also very blessed. Our staff has put in long hours and has shown a lot of resilience in making rapid transitions to new ways of communicating the word. Many of us yearned for a return to in-person service and our revenues have been affected by the building closure. However, despite being turbulent, our overall financial situation to date has been reasonably good and we acknowledge that many organizations are struggling to a much larger extent.

With this understanding, we seek to be vigilant but not greedy. We believe that it is time to consider sending half of our forgiven Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan amount to those in greater need. Having received that loan, and then loan forgiveness, has certainly provided more financial security. However, even the full amount of the forgiven PPP loan would only cover our expenses for about two months. Therefore, it cannot be thought of as a method to fund our mission as we look forward.

Leadership will review our financial position at the end of September. If our financial indicators continue to look good, the plan is to distribute \$43,100 to organizations facing more significant challenges than our own. If our financial indicators suggest increased financial risk, the distribution will be put on hold. Regardless of the outcome in September, we will undergo a similar review process at the end of December. At any point in time, if our financial position takes a more pronounced turn for the worse, the remaining forgiven PPP loan and Employee Retention Credit (ERC) fund monies could be used to help us operate in the short term.

If and when appropriate financially, leadership has suggested making up to five larger, more impactful, donations. With that in mind, we have created a preliminary list of organizations to be considered as potential recipients (alphabetical order by column):

LCGS Mission Vision Task Force (MVTF)

2021

Why a Transition Task Force?

Great question! First some brief history. LCGS's first Transition Task Force (TTF) was appointed in 2002. The year prior, the Sr. Pastor had accepted a call to Benson, Minnesota and an Interim Pastor, Paul Svingen, was called to join associate LCGS pastor Tim Berdahl, provided both expertise and pastoral guidance through this transitional time. The early 2000s were a period of change for LCGS. The TTF agreed that LCGS had moved from a pastoral-size to a program-size church which meant that the church leadership structure might have to be reimagined and reorganized. The LCGS Mission, Vision and leadership structure we have today was the result of the work of the TTF. The 2003 Transition Task Force Report provides significant additional history and detail of the work and outcomes - it's worth a read.

So why is a new Mission Vision Task Force (MVTF) needed at this time? The 2002 TTF's purpose was to develop a comprehensive plan as to how the LCGS congregation, staff and volunteers can best work together over the next 3 to 5 years to embrace and expand the congregation's ministry in accordance with its Mission Statement. That was 19 years and a global pandemic ago! Since that time, we know much has changed in the ways the Gospel can be shared and the ways people experience God.

From the publication "Temporary Shepherds", Pastor Warren Schulz introduces three concepts which are connected, but not synonymous.

Change: The inevitable movement of life's forces.

Transition: The process by which we must deal with the inevitable changes of life (the interim) **Transformation**: The new shape that occurs after transition, toward which change is aimed.

What's in scope and what's out of scope?

The Vision Council believes the current LCGS Mission and Vision statements (see page 2) are as relevant today as they were in 2003. The MVTF is being asked to reaffirm the Mission and Vision. Ideally, we won't need to go through a lengthy process of developing a new Mission and Vision for LCGS. That is not the intent of the MVTF. The MVTF is being asked to focus on the leadership team and staffing structure to ensure we have the right resources in place to achieve the Mission and Vision. They are also being asked to map out a plan, in coordination with staff and the leadership teams (Experiencing God, Reaching Out, Nurturing Faith, and Resource Development) for the next 3-5 years.

The MVTF will comprise the working groups detailed below and MVTF members will be asked to serve on one of these three working groups. Working groups will elect a chair and set their own meeting schedule. Working group chairs will ensure a written update of their group's activity, progress and findings is provided prior to each MVTF meeting.

Mission/Vision

Identify current and prospective member's spiritual desires and personal vision for who we are, what LCGS should look like in the future, and what the role of the church should be. Review and make a recommendation to affirm or amend the current LCGS Mission and Vision statements.

Staffing Needs

Identify and prioritize staffing and volunteer needs required in order to support, develop and grow LCGS's ministry. Review and update or develop new position descriptions as appropriate.

Self Study

To uncover the identity (the who, what, where, and how) of LCGS in this place (Lakeside, Duluth, synod-wide, church-wide). Using templates from the 2003 Transition Task Force Report - modifying as appropriate - gather demographic information and conduct a survey of congregation to help identify desired changes needed to move us forward. A variety of methods will be utilized including questionnaires/surveys, demographic analysis, small group forums, and one-on-one conversations. **The Mission and Vision Team is:**
